

At the end of October, I saw something that scared me and it had nothing to do with Halloween. I received an email from Ford saying that as of Jan. 1, 2024 we could no longer sell any F-650 or F-750 chassis with diesel engines into California. Now this was Ford's choice. To be clear, California did not pass a law saying, "Ford cannot sell F-650 of F-750 diesel powered trucks into California." California has received a waiver pursuant to section 209(b) of the Federal Clean Air Act. The California Air Resources Board (CARB) has issued a standard on how much NOx can be produced by an engine in an over 19500# GVWR vehicle. Ford doesn't build a diesel engine that will do that. And I have found out that neither have many truck manufacturers.

Now I can hear many of you saying to yourself, "Ed, you have been at work too long and you are rambling on in automotive gobbilty gook."

Stick with me for a few more sentences.

I view this as a shot across the bow on the internal combustion engine. Yes, it is commercial trucks for now. But how long until laws are passed that restrict the Motorcycle you want to buy. Will you be able to buy one powered the way you want? Or will your manufacturer of choice not be able to offer it because it's not "clean" enough.

Don't get me wrong, if you want to ride an electric motorcycle or even one that is wind powered. If you can operate it safely: Cool, Enjoy, Have a great day on the road and We are here for your rights and safety too. I just want to preserve choice for those that want it. For those that didn't know it, California has already banned the sale of new gas powered lawn equipment, chainsaws and other small engine applications.

Remember 14 states plus the District of Columbia have already adopted at least one CARB standard. In 2025 three more states will join the club and in 2026 one more will join.

The U.S. House of Representatives passed HR 1435 to protect the choice of an internal combustion engine. The U.S. Senate is working on \$2090, which is their version. The Motorcycle Riders Foundation recently sent out an alert about this.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Please take the time to go to the MRF's website, find the alert and click on the link to ask Ohio's Senators to support this effort.

There are currently HR 198 and SR 155 in the Ohio State House doing a similar thing. There is also HB 201 in the Ohio House of Representative to prevent a state agency from adopting the California emissions standard for motor vehicles. ABATE will be sending out alerts when we need to act on these issues.

With is being the Christmas season, take some time and relax with the ones you love and get recharged. It looks like we are going to have a busy next year. Be Safe.

Two More Bills Aimed at Protecting the Internal Combustion Engine

At the end of October, Senators John Kennedy (R-LA), Mike Crapo (R-ID) and Pete Ricketts (R-NE) introduced the Choice in Automobile Retail Sales (CARS) Act, S. 3094. This bill has a House companion bill, introduced by Representative Tim Walberg (R-MI) and Andrew Clyde (R-GA), H.R. 4468.

These bills would prohibit the Administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) from finalizing, implementing, or enforcing a regulation concerning emissions for light-duty and medium -duty vehicles starting with model year 2027. The bills would prevent the EPA from mandating the use of specific technology in new motor vehicles or issuing rules that result in the limited availability of motor vehicles to end-use consumers based on the engine in that vehicle. Furthermore, the goal of these bills is to preserve American automobile manufacturing and protect access for American consumers to choose affordable, dependable and functional automobiles for their needs.

As you can see, the focus of these bills is similar to H.R. 1435 and S. 2090 Preserving Choice in Vehicle Purchases Acts, which focus on taking away the power of individual states to prohibit the sale of internal combustion engines. California specifically, has targeted the internal combustion engine for extinction.

These new CARS Acts are focused directly on stopping the Federal Government and the EPA from attacks on internal combustion engines. In March, the EPA announced plans to compel over two-thirds of new vehicles to be all electric by 2032. The CARS Act blocks this action by the EPA. The Motorcycle Riders Foundation supports all four bills focused on protecting the sale of internal combustion engines (H.R. 1435, H.R. 4468, S.2090 and S.3094). Whether accomplished by state bureaucrats in Sacramento or federal bureaucrats in Washington, D.C., the assault on the internal combustion engine needs to be stopped.

Luckily, there are legislators in Washington, D.C. who are fighting back. Here are a few quotes on the issue from three U.S. Senators.

Senator Kennedy (LA) said, "I'm proud to support the CARS Act to stop the EPA's radical rule, which would make the American dream more expensive for millions of hardworking people in our country."

Senator Crapo (ID) added, "Americans deserve to have access to affordable, reliable vehicles fueled by American-made energy products. Consequences of rules and regulations such as these restrict consumer choice and raise costs for the average American family."

Senator Ricketts (NE) concluded by stating, "I'll always fight to protect Nebraskans' ability to choose what is best for them and their families."

The MRF is proud to defend the internal combustion engine. Keep your eyes peeled for a call to action on both bills. Officials in Washington, D.C. need to hear from motorcyclists about this threat to our way of life.



Is Your Representative in a Position to Help?

As early as this week, the House of Representatives Committee on Rules will meet to discuss the annual funding bill for the U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT). The Rules Committee is the last stop before bills go to the full floor for a vote. It provides all lawmakers the opportunity to submit amendments to a bill for the full House to consider.

This year, Representative Tim Walberg (R-MI) and Representative Troy Balderson (R-OH) have submitted an amendment to the USDOT funding bill that states:

None of the funds made available by this Act may be used by the National Highway Transportation and Safety Administration (NHTSA) for activities intended to encourage states to adopt legislation, regulations, policies, directives, or guidance to profile motorcycle riders, nor shall such funds be used by States to implement any activity with the primary intent of profiling motorcycle riders.

How can you help?

At this point, ONLY the thirteen (13) members of the Rules Committee have the power to approve the amendment. So, if one of the following thirteen (13) members is your Representative, pick up the phone and call your Representative. Ask them to "Vote yes, in the Rules Committee hearing on the Walberg/Balderson, Amendment #137 to H.R. 4820. Help protect bikers from being unfairly profiled!"

If you do not know how to contact your Congressional Representative, call the main switchboard at (202) 224-3121 to be connected to the correct office.

Remember ONLY these thirteen (13) members have the power to move this amendment forward. If you can help, pick up the phone and make the call today!

States Care About Right-to-Repair Too

Tuesday, voters in Maine passed Question 4, allowing local repair shops and mechanics access to the same data as dealerships. This ballot measure sought to establish an automotive Right-to-Repair.

The Maine ballot asked, "Do you want to require vehicle manufacturers to standardize on-board diagnostic systems and provide remote access to those systems and mechanical data to owners and independent repair facilities?"

A "yes" vote allows all mechanical information about a vehicle to be available beyond dealerships. This availability would include activities such as, being able to diagnose and repair a vehicle along with regular maintenance issues.

Maine is the sixth state in the U.S. to approve some standard of Right-to-Repair protections. Maine joins the states of California, Colorado, Massachusetts, Minnesota and New York with laws regarding the Right-to-Repair on their books.

What is most exciting about the recent action in Maine is that voters overwhelmingly approved the measure. The most recent vote totals show 84% of Mainers voted to protect the Right-to-Repair!

While the Right-to-Repair is gaining traction in Washington, D.C., demonstrably, voters and state governments are not waiting for federal officials to act. The momentum behind the Right-to-Repair is gaining steam. The Motorcycle Riders Foundation is proud to support this movement and defend a consumers access to the tools, parts and information needed to service and repair products.

Congratulations to the State of Maine! Well done!

Training Available for riders in Ohio offered by Motorcycle Ohio & Personal Intro

MO Who?

Motorcycle Ohio (MO)! Surely you've heard of them? Wait, what, you say you don't know who they are? Let me clue you in a bit.

Motorcycle Ohio offers courses for new, intermediate, and more advanced riders. Their goal is to help Ohioans learn how to ride a motorcycle safely. MO seeks to provide affordable motorcycle rider training courses to aid in reducing fatalities and injuries on Ohio's roadways through three major components: rider education, public information campaigns and licensing improvement. MO is funded by motorcycle license fees and class registrations.

ABATE of Ohio, Inc. was foundational in having the vision to push for rider safety when in 1988 they worked with the Ohio Assembly to set in place a grant system for motorcycle safety training. Motorcycle Ohio Uses an approach where existing motorcyclists aid in providing the funding for the courses. To do this, a portion of each motorcycle registration fee is set aside to fund Motorcycle Ohio's training programs. These funds are used to provide grantees, that are under contract to Motorcycle Ohio, the resources to pay for site rental, instructor pay, bike gas & maintenance and other costs. Motorcycle Ohio also uses some of the funds to purchase appropriate bikes for beginning riders to develop their riding skills that are provided to the grantees for use throughout the training year.

Quick Quiz: How much of each registration fee is used in Ohio to provide training? ______(Answer at bottom).

For a beginning rider or someone who wants to ride, but has never been on a motorcycle, the path to getting their license endorsement would be via the Basic Riders Skills (BRS).

(1) BRS: During this 16-hour course, students will participate in four hours of classroom, and 12 hours of on-cycle training covering topics such as cornering, braking, swerving, and traffic interaction. No experience is required, and MO provides the motorcycles and potentially the helmets (site specific). The goal of the BRS is to help riders acquire the basic knowledge and skills required for safe and responsible motorcycling in a license-waiver eligible course.

Then, as you gain experience and confidence, you are encouraged to continue your training with MORE courses for experienced riders. In addition to helping riders step up to the next level, these courses are a great way to meet other riders and form lasting friendships. The courses offered for riders are: (12) Basic Rider Skills for Returning Riders (BRS-RR), (3) the Basic Riders Skills -2 (BRS-2) or finally (4) the Advanced Riders Skills (ARS). To pick which one is the best match for you as a more experienced rider, consider the course content:

- (2) BRS-RR: For adult riders who have been riding for at least a year or riding again after time away or to refresh their skills in the spring, Returning Rider is the course to take. This is a one-day (8-hour) license-waiver eligible course. The course has two hours of classroom instruction, six hours of oncycle training and the option take an on-cycle evaluation to assess your riding skill level/take riding portion of license skill evaluation. This course is taken on MO provided motorcycles.
- (3) Basic Rider Skills-2 (BRS-2) course is an intermediate-level, one-day (six-hour) license-waiver course for experienced riders who wish to refresh and/or polish basic riding skills on their own two-wheeled motorcycle or scooter (100cc and over). The BRS-2 is not for novices learning to ride. This course is taken on your own personally provided motorcycle.
- (4) Advanced Rider Skills (ARS) is more skill intensive course and is currently under revision by MO. It is currently under re-development, so look for further details soon in this column.

Quiz Answer: \$6 of every registration is used to fund rider training currently.

I strongly believe in ongoing motorcycle training and have taken 4 different motorcycle classes this last year to improve and cross train my skills. Join me in this adventure. Let's go build some skills!







An Educational Minute

When is riding season over? I get asked this question quite often. My answer is "never"! Even though the weather is turning colder, there are many ways to keep warm while enjoying your motorcycle this winter. Let's discuss some of the implications and solutions:

- •If you encounter frost in the shadows you should probably turn back! Your motorcycle will tend to slide out in the turns and can be very dangerous.
- •Protect your body When the body senses a drop in core temperature, the response is to shut down blood flow to the extremities, starting with fingers and toes. Your head is an extremity too so less blood going to the brain can lead to silly mistakes.
- •Preventing hypothermia If you find yourself in a situation, add more layers by insulating your neck, hands, and feet. Use whatever you have in your bag (ie, socks, bandanas, etc).
- •Take extra rest breaks Get inside for a hot cup of cof-

fee and thaw out before continuing on your journey.

- •Frostbite and hypothermia are no joke If you find yourself shivering or feeling confused/irritable, consider stopping for the night!
- •Get some good heated gear a heated jacket will keep your core nice and toasty and will allow you to enjoy your ride for a little longer!

LEGISLATIVE NEWS

Legislatively ABATE of Ohio Inc. is still working on getting legislation introduced to increase the penalties for right of way violations that result in serious injuries or fatalities. I am moving slowly on this to ensure that it is completed right. We are finalizing the Anti-profiling legislation also. I will be keeping you informed on these proposed bills so that when we get them introduced everyone can contact their representatives to support this legislation.

Also, ABATE of Ohio Inc.continues to support the MRF agenda by writing to our federal representatives to request them to become a cosponsor to H.R. 906, the REPAIR Act. This resolution supports our belief that vehicle owners or repair shops should not be denied access to the information, software or tools needed to work on vehicles. The proposed law also establishes rules regarding vehicle data access.

Another issue that is important to many of us, is being able to continue to operate our vehicles gasoline fueled vehicles. We are requesting our federal senators to support S. 2090, the "Preserving Choice in Vehicle Purchases Act." S. 2090 would amend the Clean Air Act to prevent a ban on the sale of internal combustion engines in new motor vehicles. The Federal House of Representatives has already passed H.R. 1435, their version of a resolution regarding this issue. Because the federal legislators have moved so slowly regarding this issue, the Ohio Senate has prepared their own resolution, S. R. No. 15 which is due to be introduced on November 15th. The Ohio House has a companion resolution, House Resolution No. 198 which has identical language. Get your local Representatives and Senators to sign on as cosponsors to this legislation.

You can find form letters elsewhere in this publication regarding these issues. Just change the name and address to reflect your legislator's information on the top and put your own information at the bottom and send it off. Or better yet, write your own letter. Or save your letter writing skills and call your legislator's office and tell them what you want done. We DO have to fight to keep our lifestyle alive!

CAN I GET ANY RELIEF UNDER THE LEMON LAW ACT?

Q. I purchased a new 2022 Harley-Davidson CVO Tri Glide last March, I have had nothing but problems with it ever since. It has been in 3-4 Harley-Davidson Dealerships getting worked on for the same problems and they can't figure out what is wrong with it. It has been back in my local Harley-Davidson dealership since July 19th and they have been

working with Milwaukee over the phone trying to find out what is wrong, and they still don't know. I have over \$50k in the bike. Does the Lemon Law Act cover this ? Thanks John P. - ABATE of IN Member

A. John, Sorry to say that Indiana does not have a lemon law that applies to motorcycles. My experience is that Harley-Davidson will try its best to make you happy and fix the problem. Harley is reporting it is a wiring harness defect (a wiring harness made overseas). Keep track of your costs as a result of this issue as those costs may be recoverable. Also, confirm every conversation with the Harley rep via email (it doesn't count unless it is in writing) and show a cc to me, that might help. Keep me posted, Rod.

LITIGATION FUNDING, OR HOW DOES AN INJURED BIKER PAY THE MORTGAGE WHILE THEIR CASE IS PENDING?

Everyone knows that waiting on the case to settle can be financially painful. Injured bikers with a strapped budget have a much harder time riding out the storm until a settlement is reached, sometimes causing them to settle for less than their case is worth. Plaintiffs that have sustained injuries and are now disabled may very well need money to live on during the interim period before they receive their settlement. Moreover, an insurance company, or other wealthy litigant, will probably be in no hurry to settle until they reach an agreement more in their favor, regardless of how long that may take. Regretfully, this is where litigation funding tries to justify its existence. Litigation funding companies may advance a plaintiff money for living expenses, medical care, or for whatever else the money is needed for a stake in the final settlement. This type of lending is non recourse, meaning that in the case the plaintiff loses, they owe nothing to the funding company. The borrower is only liable for repayment from the settlement money they receive. Of course, this is not all bliss, and should only be used as a LAST RESORT. The interest a client will owe on the advancement can be unreasonable.

These companies decide interest rates and the amount they are willing to advance based on the merits of the case. So the stronger the case, the better deal the injured biker will receive. The longer the case takes to settle, the higher the effective interest rate, which begs the question, "does this really level the playing field?" Well, maybe in a few cases, but probably not in most. With the litigation funding industry still in adolescent stages, it will be a few more years before we can decide whether or not this is a good thing. In some states, the practice of litigation funding may be illegal. In the meantime, here are a few pointers if this is your only option:

- Talk with your attorney and discuss options before making any decisions
- Exhaust all other means of financing first, as this should be a last resort

LET'S GO FOR A RIDE AND VISIT SANTA ANNA'S LEG IN SPRINGFIELD - HE ACCIDENTLY INVENTED CHEWING GUM AND THE CUBS

Did he really invent chewing gum - chiclets? The story goes that an inventor watched Santa chewing the stuff and thought it would be a good rubber substitute. It didn't work. Trying to make something out of nothing, the inventor took the stuff to a druggist who made chewable balls. CAN MY EMPLOYER DO THAT? BIKE SHOP BLUES.

Q. I'm a mechanic in a local bike shop, and my employer recently told me I need to sign an agreement that I won't work for another shop within a ten mile radius if I leave my current job. I don't think that's fair. There are a number of bike shops around here, and almost all of them are within ten miles from my current employer. Can they really enforce that agreement against me? **A.** Probably. What they have asked you to sign is called a non-compete agreement. It used to be that non-compete agreements were used only with managers or sales personnel. However, they are becoming more common with service personnel who develop relationships with customers and entice customers to follow them if they move to a new employer.

Even though non-compete agreements are not favored by the law, if they follow the rules, those agreements are generally enforceable, provided the employer can show a reasonable belief that a departing employee could create unfair competition. However, non-compete agreements have to be reasonable in their restrictions. They can restrict a person from working in the same field, but only for a reasonable time period or within a reasonable distance from the employer's service area.

If your employer makes it a condition of your employment you may have no choice but to sign the agreement if you want to keep working there. If you sign the agreement and leave the job later, the employer can ask a court to prevent you from working for a competitor. If the court finds that the agreement contains reasonable restrictions, and doesn't unfairly limit your rights to find a new job, the court could enter an order preventing you from working for the competitor and assess damages against you.



Antique Mini Engine Kits ... Christmas Gift?

Retrol V-Twin Motorcycle Engine



For motorcycle enthusiasts, an appropriate choice is this Retrol V-Twin motorcycle engine kit, which sells for \$899.99. This kit is a 1/5 scale model of the Harley-Davidson Knucklehead motorcycle engine that was introduced in 1936. This engine kit is made of brass and stainless steel and comes with a flat wooden base for mounting.

The four-stroke gas-powered engine includes an adjustable carburetor, and each cylinder has a bore of 13 millimeters and stroke of 16 millimeters, making the engine's

total displacement 4.2 cubic centimeters. The engine takes a 1/4-32 Thread ME8 Spark Plug and requires a pre-mixed 25/1 fuel/oil blend to run properly.

It can be started with a power drill or the included pull start cord, and the spark is provided by three AA batteries, which are not included in the kit.





One day when messing around in the garage and working on a project. Jonsie, Paul, and myself were telling stories as we usually do. We were sharing mostly motorcycle, sea, and war stories, but Paul stole the stage and rightly so when he told us to saddle up for a doozie.

This story is a true account.

February 1991 Operation Desert Storm Iraq

Early in the morning around 0400 after doing multiple false insertions in order to throw off the enemy as to their true position and flying low enough to keep the antiaircraft guns off of them Sgt. Drodouski and his team of five other Rangers rushed out of a CH-47 Chinook helicopter and onto the flat barren desert floor deep into enemy territory. The mission: Patrol on foot, locate any and all enemy activity and facilities. Identify to coalition forces. Duration of mission: unknown.

Under the cover of darkness the Rangers hit the ground and immediately used their entrenching tools to dig a hole large enough to fit six men and all of their equipment. For the fortunate who do not know, the Iraqi desert is a hard packed rocky soil. It's no easy task to dig a hole. Let alone one to fit six Rangers up to their necks and the amount of equipment and provisions they had for this mission of an unknown timeline.

From eyesight, you couldn't see anything in any direction from that hole. Every morning the patrol would set an azimuth and beat feet in search of enemy activity or infrastructure. Some days after patrolling all day under the hot Iraqi sun nothing would be seen. Nevertheless the mission goes on day after day.

When the Rangers were back at their hole they called home they would take turns cleaning and inspecting each other's feet and weapons. In the flat open desert, sand storms also know as "Haboobs" were prevalent which would saturate the Soldier's gear, weapons, and body. The sand would find it's way into the most delicate parts of their weapons and bodies, but with true grit and determination these men pushed through.

On one particular day while on patrol Sgt. Drodouski could see in the great distance what looked like enemy troops, vehicles, and equipment. The Rangers were not as easy to spot as there were only six of them and they were dispersed about the desert landscape. These well trained, heavily armed Rangers were no fools and in that moment muscle memory kicked in as they hit the deck exploiting any micro-terrain they could find for concealment all the while hoping they weren't already compromised.

Being compromised and captured was a conversation these brave men have rehearsed plenty in their minds and knew in their hearts that it wasn't an option. While laying prone on the Earth in a land so far from home, Sgt. Drodouski gets a better look and realizes that they are looking at a company to battalion sized element.

Knowing their odds against a force of such magnitude were no match, Sgt Drodouski breaks radio silence to report the activity, simultaneously producing his laser identifier to mark targets. Every minute there lying felt like an hour. The patrol had to maintain their position while Sgt. Drodouski kept his lazer identifier fixed onto the target because calculated coordinates could not be guaranteed and any miscalculations would be detrimental.

After some moments have passed, fast mover jets fly past the patrol and towards the target for identification... and then drop a payload of ordnance onto it. While the patrol didn't stick around to review and recon the aftermath, they used the chaos as an opportunity to aid in their concealment and patrol cautiously back to their hide.

While back at the hole the next day the Rangers get a message over they're radio to stand by for exfiltration and nothing else. The word is past to all members and they prepared themselves and their equipment for departure. Thirty minutes go by when they see and hear an aircraft flying their way. They were not naive and foolish enough to assume it to be friendly forces and that assumption quickly became fear when a Cobra aunship comes into view and towards them setting up for a gun run on their position. One of the younger members of the team starts ripping at his rucksack and to Sgt. Drodouski's amazement produces a three foot by five foot American flag that wasn't supposed to be in his pack once noticed during pre mission planning but nevertheless at this moment that didn't matter while two members held the Stars and Stripes as wide and tall as they could in hopes that they had enough time for the pilot to see.

Whether the pilot saw the flag or knew the Soldiers were there was irrelevant. The pilot banked the aunship (then in one of the coolest moments that can happen in one's life), gave the Rangers a big thumbs up which was greatly appreciated considering what could have happened. Shortly after the Cobra gunship incident a CH-47 Chinook helicopter landed in the distance about 150 meters away. The team then watched the ramp drop on the chopper and oddly enough six men wearing green camouflage on rattle can green dirt bikes come racing toward them. While the bikes were en route to the Ranger's position the Chinook helicopter closed it's ramp and lifted off. Once the modified dirt bikes made it to the Soldier's hole they were instructed to hop on as best as possible with all of their gear and prepare for departure. Cruising through the open desert at a moderate rate of speed the Ranger's were mentally preparing for the upcoming debrief that would surely be happening when they arrive to base.

When the team make it back to base and before they had a chance for debriefing they quickly replenished their equipment, cleaned weapons, and prepared for the next mission.

This is a true account and not only because of this mission, but multiple others during Operation Desert Storm, Sgt. Drodouski received the Bronze Star.


